# A Balm for Fear

### "Some people do well with uncertainty."


noted Kendra Held, Climate Action Coordinator for the regional sustainability nonprofit, EcoAction Partners. "I am not one of them... I am a planner. When I think about natural disasters like wildfires or blizzards that knock out power, I feel fear." It's a feeling that is shared by many who live, work and play in the San Juan Mountains and the Western Slope of Colorado. Whether it's the news of wildfires in California, or recent memory of local fatalities due to avalanches, there are plenty of sobering reminders of Mother Nature's power and fury.

Yet we do live and thrive here. The communities within the San Miguel Power Association service territory are vibrant centers of recreation, tourism, and culture. A population that flourishes in such a rugged climate does so because of its resilience.

It's comforting to know that a multi-agency committee (MAC) group made up of representatives from local government, fire districts, public health and healthcare, volunteer organizations, community foundations, and private utilities meets quarterly to prepare for the hazards that pose a risk to our area through planning, training, and resource allocation. In 2025, the MAC group will be involved in the Colorado Emergency Preparedness Assessment, a re-write of the Community Wildfire Protection Plan, the San Miguel County Emergency Operations Plan update, and community HazMat planning and awareness, among many other things.

"When I see how the members of our communities connect with each other to become better prepared," says Held, "it's like a balm for the fear."

Among the dangers that threaten our lifestyle, there is the ever-present possibility of losing electrical power. Weather events, constant erosion, and naturally occurring incidents are some of the most common causes of power outages in our region. This fact has driven SMPA to search for ways to help improve the resiliency of its communities' electrical infrastructure.



Recently, SMPA has managed to secure funding for feasibility and planning for microgrid projects in Ophir, Rico, Ridgway and for communications backup at both SMPA facilities in Ridgway and Nucla. As a result, additional construction grants in Ridgway and Rico have been obtained for large battery systems. The SMPA communications feasibility projects have led to construction grants for battery backup in Ridgway as well as a solar and battery system in Nucla. And additional funds have been made available for a new battery system at Ridgway's Space-to-Create building and for additional carportmounted solar arrays at the SMPA facility in Ridgway. These funds, granted by the Colorado Department of Local Affairs (DOLA), through their Microgrids for Community Resiliency (MCR) program, come to a total of \$4.5 million, which is nearly half of the total awarded throughout the state.

Additionally, the Silverton GOLD (Goal of Less Dependency) resiliency team, in which SMPA is a partner, has advanced to Phase 2 of the U.S. Department of Energy's Office of Clean Energy Demonstrations (OCED) New Era Grant process. Thus far, the team has accessed \$83,000 for energy storage system, solar array and microgrid design feasibility. The data and planning from these phases will inform a future construction grant application. Feasibility work is also being done for behindthe-meter microgrids at Silverton anchor institutions like the Town Hall and Fire Department.

# MEMBER DIVIDENDS

As a cooperative, San Miguel Power Association (SMPA) is owned by its members, and member dividends, also known as "capital credits", reflect each member's ownership in the cooperative. From time to time, allocations for a given year or combination of years are cashed out as "Member Dividends" and returned to the members, which can include individuals and organizations alike.

This year, the co-op sent out nearly \$1 million in unclaimed Member Dividend checks to members who received electric service during 1995. One such member was the Norwood School. "Norwood Public Schools greatly appreciate the Dividend Check from San Miguel Power," stated Todd Bissell, Interim Superintendent of Norwood Public Schools. "Staff will be able to use the money to buy classroom materials that will enhance and enrich the educational opportunities for the students at NPS. Thanks again for the Dividend Check."
