### A Porch Light to Come Back To...

IN MANY WAYS, THE BEST REMINDER OF THE VALUE OF OUR MODERN LIFESTYLE IS THE VIEWPOINT OF THOSE WHO DON'T SHARE IT. LATER THIS MONTH, SAN MIGUEL POWER JOURNEYMAN LINEMAN, K.J. JOHNSON WILL LEAVE HIS ELECTRIFIED HOME IN NORWOOD TO VISIT THE PEOPLE OF SILLAB, LOCATED IN THE NORTHEASTERN PART OF GUATEMALA, WHERE THERE HAS NEVER BEEN RELIABLE ELECTRIC POWER.

Johnson has joined a team of managers, electricians and line workers representing both Colorado and Oklahoma to help build about six miles of power line to tap into an existing line and electrify the village. The three-week mission is part of a greater effort by the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA) to bring the benefits of the cooperative business model and of reliable, affordable electricity to areas in need.

With this vision in mind, Johnson has begun making preparations, but realities of international travel and survival in third-world conditions can be sobering. In addition to one personal bag, linemen are only allotted one fifty-pound bag of tools. This restriction means that Johnson will have to leave many

specialty tools he's grown accustomed to using behind. "My work bag with just my climbing belt, a couple tools and my hooksjust what I need to get up a pole—weighs 38 pounds." When asked about his anticipated accommodations, Johnson was unsure. "I think they've got us in a schoolhouse." He chuckles. "I'm bringing an inflatable camp pillow, but I'm not even sure if I'll have a bed."


Nonetheless, Johnson's excitement is palpable, and it seems to be about more than just bringing electricity to those who don't currently have it. He explains it like this: "It shows who we are and what we stand for. It doesn't matter if you are a billionaire or some dude with a one-room shack, you're a member, and we'll keep the lights on for you."


